

Homeless Count Methodology

Overview: Point In Time (PIT Count): 1/25/21

Sheltered Count

- Emergency Shelter, Transitional Housing, & Safe Haven from HMIS data
 - Will be auto-populated from HMIS
 - Non-HMIS projects enter data into the PIT Database

Unsheltered Count

- Street Outreach (SO) from HMIS Data*
- No statewide canvassing by volunteers
- SO projects not in HMIS will be added to PIT Database. Staff will input aggregate data
- New: Service Based Count to be used as a check on the unsheltered numbers



2022 PIT Count

On **Tuesday, January 25, 2022,** the State of Connecticut will conduct its annual statewide Point-in-Time (PIT) Count of people experiencing homelessness

- · The PIT Count will consist of people experiencing <u>unsheltered</u> homelessness
- In addition, the PIT Count of people experiencing <u>sheltered</u> homelessness; and the Housing Inventory Chart



High level methodology summary

- There will be a modified version of an in-person count using outreach staff and volunteers
- The methodology uses a sample of in-person outreach data, as well as HMIS data.
- In addition, data from agencies that currently do not use HMIS, will be entered in aggregate format in the PIT Database



What is staying the same?

- CT PIT database
- Use of HMIS data
- Data extrapolation
- Regional Coordinators Collaboration



Key differences from previous counts

- New Contractor ACT will be overseeing this year's PIT count
- Service based count & HMIS data

Traditional community canvassing methodology shift to random sampling for unsheltered individuals

- Condensed data collection from unsheltered individuals
- Integration of PATH outreach and local CANs data in unsheltered count (HMIS & Non-HMIS) Although this was used before, it will be executed in a different way



Upcoming PIT Count (Unsheltered)

- The collection of aggregate de-identified client data from HMIS to the PIT database for street outreach
- The collection of HUD required Sub-Population
- The collection of HUD required demographic data



Upcoming PIT Count (Unsheltered)

- HMIS Data+Service Based Count with verification questions
- First 3 letters of person's first & last name+month and birth year

FFF+LLL+MMDDYYYY	Did you sleep in: the Street, Sidewalk, vehicle, inhabitable location?	Did you sleep in: transitional housing, motel, hotel, jail, hospital, treatment program, emergency shelter, with a friend, house or apartment, or in jail?	Did any other person ask you these questions?
BRE+COL+11301988	Yes	No	No

- The service-based count will take place over seven days (1/26/2022-2/1/2022)
- Verification lists (HMIS)
- CAN outreach
- Programs that use HMIS: Outreach Program staff can add if person was experiencing unsheltered homelessness on night of count using assessment in HMIS
- · Programs who do not use HMIS:
 - Outreach Program staff will add aggregate data in the PIT database
 - Nutmeg will add programs to PIT database who are not using HMIS
 - Additional data entry may be required to de-duplicate data



Youth Count

- There will not be a specific youth count in 2022, but Youth will be included in HIC-PIT
- ACT will solicit and collect information from youth-serving organizations
- The 2022 count will include all youth under 25 years of age in collected data



Housing Inventory Count

- ACT to work with Nutmeg IT to ensure PIT database is accurately updated
- ACT to work with Regional Coordinators to verify and update HIC data



Data Quality Assurance Strategies

- ACT will provide COCs with updates on data provided by agencies
- ACT will work with Nutmeg to ensure duplicates are fixed
- ACT will ensure that all data quality concerns are promptly remediated

New Projects

Bonus and Reallocation Funding:

- 11 PSH projects to be submitted as 5 PSH applications
- 66 new rental assistance units with support services
- Support services only to 187 households
- Supportive Services Only Coordinated Entry Expansion (SSO-CE)

Domestic Violence Bonus

- TH/RRH 5 new TH units and 10 new RRH units
- RRH 33 new units
- DV Supportive Services Only (SSO) Coordinated Entry (CE)

Ranking of CT BOS New Projects

Report on Vote: Ranking order electronically voted on/approved by Non-Conflicted Steering Committee Members:

- 1. PSH new project that scored highest by the Scoring Committee in Tier 1.
- 2. Rank in Tier 1 a small (approximately \$40K) PSH project that will fit nearly entirely in Tier 1 and earn the CoC 5 bonus points on BOS CoC Application for leveraging non-CoC Housing Subsidies.
- 3. Bulk of remaining funds in a PSH project at approximately \$2.038M.
- 4. Remaining funds in a PSH project at approximately \$190.5K.



Reallocation – CREDO, 0150 PSH Project



- Report on Vote: Non-conflicted SC members voted electronically to reallocate 0150
- Seven PSH units in Waterbury
- Monitored in 2016 and declined to provide plan to address significant findings, including: coordination w/CAN; documentation of eligibility; and ensuring that CoC operating funds are not utilized on units supported by a federal rental assistance subsidy.
- Performed poorly on renewal evaluations and was in Corrective Action for three years in a row (2019, 2020, & 2021).
- Renewal Evaluation Corrective Action Plans consistently inadequate to address performance issues.

Reallocation – CREDO, 0150 PSH Project (2)



- Agency notified of the intent to propose reallocation to the Steering Committee in March 2021
- Over past 7 months, Co-Chairs provided the agency specific actions to resolve issues and met 3 times w/agency.
- Provided multiple opportunities to correct issues and agency has been unable to address performance and compliance concerns.
- DOH offered Rental Assistance Program subsidies (RAPs) to be used in project in lieu of CoC funds. Agency rejected the offer.
- DOH remains committed to providing RAPs to the existing tenants to enable them to move out of the building with a housing voucher.

- Annual CoC Consolidated Application
- HIC/PIT (including CAN Support)
- Agency and System HMIS Reporting
- Consumer Leadership Involvement Project (CLIP)

CT BOS LGBTQIA+ Draft Policies

Policy on Ensuring a Safe, Healthy, Inclusive, Affirming and Discrimination-free Environment for LGBTQIA+ Individuals



Background

- Connecticut law <u>prohibits discrimination</u> in employment, housing, public accommodations and credit transactions on the basis of sex, transgender status, gender identity, gender expression, sexual orientation and civil union status.
- HUD's Equal Access to Housing Rules prohibits certain forms of discrimination



Goals of Policy

- Support compliance HUD's Equal Access Rules and with laws prohibiting discrimination against LGBTQI individuals
- Promote strategies to provide all individuals who interact with CT BOS and agencies funded by CT BOS with a safe, healthy, inclusive, affirming and discrimination-free environment.

DOH Waiver Request - Vote

Motion: To approve DOH's request for a waiver for their 2021 Project Application for CT 0339 RRH to exceed the CT BOS \$7500 per household cap on supportive services funding with the understanding that DOH will consolidate the grant in the 2022 Competition with one or more other RRH projects in their portfolio, thereby bringing the consolidated supportive services budget line item in line with the cap.
