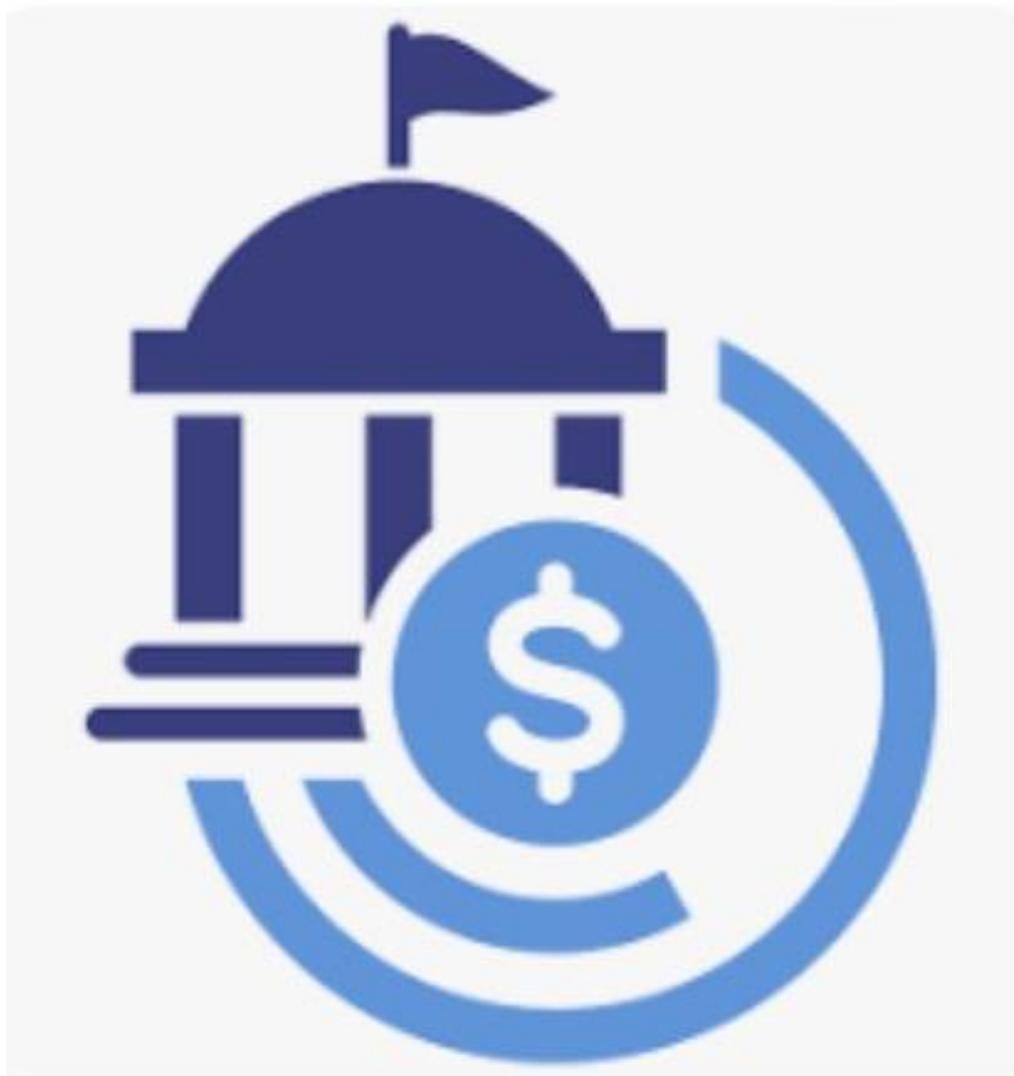

CoC Competition

Updates on CoC NOFO Lawsuits & Impact on Awards Delay

NAEH vs. Turner, et al & Washington State vs. HUD

- Lawsuits seek to: vacate the 2025 NOFO, reinstate 2024-2025 two-year NOFO, renew all projects expiring in CY2026, block challenged program changes
- 12/8 HUD withdrew the NOFO
 - Announced intent to issue modified NOFO
- 12/19 hearing– may result in a preliminary injunction



Good News! Emergency State Response to Delays/Gaps in CoC Funding

- NOFO withdrawal likely to create additional delays with grants & Grantees should not expect grant agreements until at least June 2026
- Cannot draw down funds until grants are executed
- The state is committing up to \$5.2 million to HUD grants that expire before June 30, 2026
- DOH and DMHAS are deciding which agency will contract with those private non-profit providers impacted by the HUD CoC delays

- Details how projects will submit a project application in the 2025 CoC competition
- Includes info for project applications
 - ✓ budget amounts
 - ✓ project application types (renewal, new-transition, new-regular, YHDP replacement)
 - ✓ Component type (PSH, TH, etc.)
- Based on the Guiding Principles for Permanent Housing Retention adopted by Steering Committee

1. PSH Grants Retained as PSH	Renewal Project App
2. Renewal Grants – Unchanged	Renewal Project App
3. PSH Grants Transitioning to TH	New Transition Grant Project App
4. RRH Grants Transitioning to TH	New Transition Grant Project App
5. DV Bonus Grant Transitioning to TH	New Regular Project App
6. YHDP Grants Changing to TH	YHDP Replacement Project App

Draft Engagement Principles



Draft Engagement Principles – formerly Housing First Principles
Discuss today vote in January.

- “Rules-in” approach
 - Focused on maximizing access to housing and services
 - Apply entry restrictions only when needed for safety or funder requirements
- Entry processes are holistic and inclusive
 - Case-by-case evaluation
 - No automatic disqualification based on substance use, credit, or rental/treatment/criminal history
- Housing and services promote community integration and recovery
 - Offering supportive, recovery-oriented services
 - Service participation required – adjust services to meet individual needs

Draft Engagement Principles (2)

Programs support housing stability

- Clear tenancy expectations
- Coordinated property management and services,
- Early intervention and support to meet requirements
- Due-process protections for any termination

Participants engaged through informed choice and person-centered planning

- Participants have opportunities to shape services
- Participants are supported to understand and reduce risks
- Staff intervene when necessary to protect safety





Updates on New Projects

TH/Interim Housing

- 7 projects submitted
- Scoring Committee recommends all projects move forward
- Approx \$4 Million but final budgets TBD

Supportive Services Only

- Apps for Reallocated Services funds from PSH - \$5.7 Million
- Apps to expend all bonus funds - TBD
- Coordinated Entry - \$4 Million
- HMIS - \$700,000

Domestic Violence (DV) Bonus Request For Proposals (RFP) – Due 1/16/26



- BOS seeking new projects to provide Transitional Housing/Interim Housing (TH) or Supportive Services Only - Coordinated Entry (SSO-CE) Projects
 - Funds totaling over \$2.6 million anticipated to be available
 - Projects must serve individuals and families:
 - Fleeing or attempting to flee DV, dating violence, sexual assault and stalking
 - Qualify as homeless under HUD homelessness definition [category 4](#)
- Eligible Applicants: Qualified nonprofit organizations, State and local governments, instrumentalities of state or local government, Public Housing Authorities, Native American Tribes and Tribally Designated Housing Entities

Proposal: Additional Adjustment to 2025 Renewal Evaluation Criteria

Proposed: As time permits, adjust renewal evaluation criteria as follows and rescore for use in 2025 ranking:

- Score **returns to homelessness** and set associated points at 25% of total points
- Would help increase CoC Application score and increase likelihood of retaining/expanding funding

Overview

- CT BOS and Opening Doors Fairfield County (ODFC) engaged Housing Innovations to conduct an independent evaluation the Coordinated Access Network (CAN).
- The evaluation fulfills HUD's annual Coordinated Entry System (CES) evaluation requirement.
- The review assessed compliance with federal standards and effectiveness in advancing Connecticut's goals to:
 - Reduce homelessness
 - Shorten time to housing
 - Ensure equitable access to housing and services

Key Findings



Connecticut's CES/CAN system is **aligned with HUD requirements** and functions as a comprehensive statewide coordinated entry network.



All required CES components are in place, including:

- Assessment
- Prioritization
- Referral to housing programs

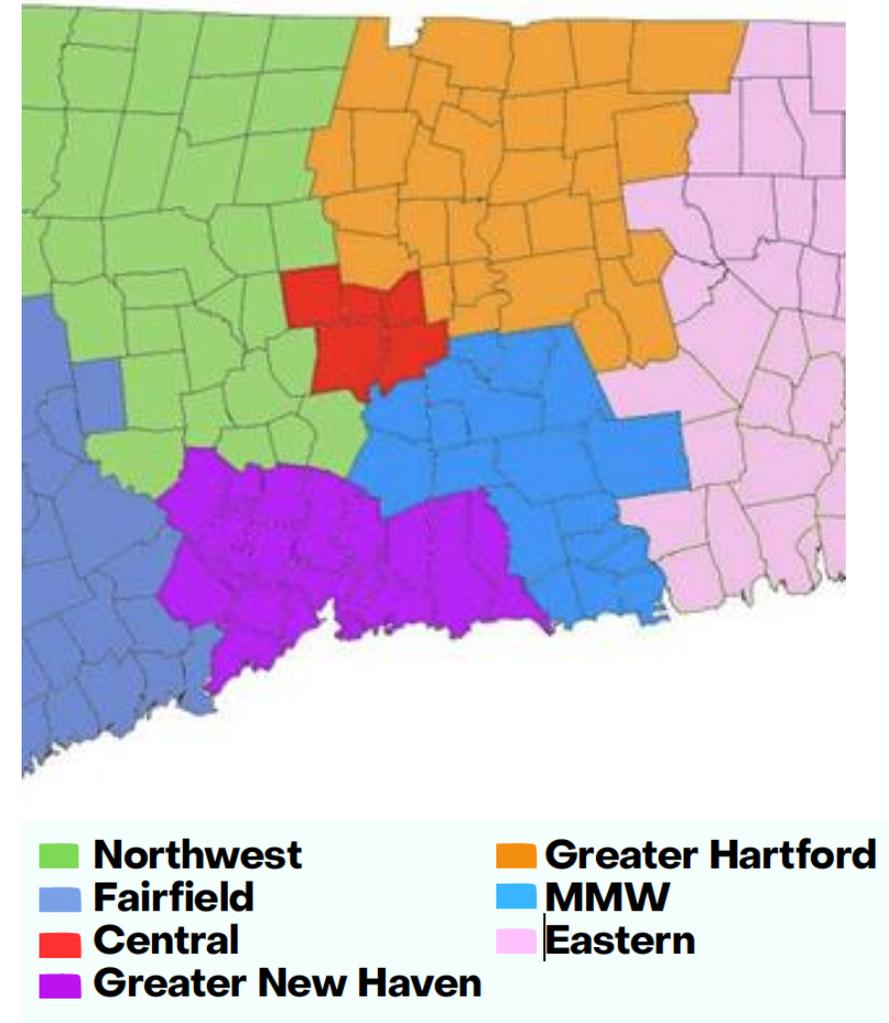


The evaluation identified opportunities to strengthen system performance by:

- Clarifying oversight and governance roles
- Standardizing procedures across regions
- More fully integrating diversion into core operations

Background

- Connecticut operates a statewide, regionalized Coordinated Access Network model:
 - Seven subregions,
 - Each administered by a local backbone organization.
- Access to the system begins through the 2-1-1 housing crisis hotline, with referrals to:
 - Regional CANs for assessment, or
 - Local HUB drop-in centers for in-person assistance.
- HUBs offer connections to shelter, diversion, and housing resources.
- Regional discretion can result in variation in staffing, hours, forms, and procedures.



CAN Strengths

Reach and Scope

- Comprehensive statewide coverage across all regions and populations.
- Multiple access points through 2-1-1 and HUBs, both virtual and in-person.

Organization

- Standardized assessment and prioritization framework.
- Strong integration with Continuum of Care governance.
- Compliance with federal coordinated entry requirements.

Services

- Collaborative case conferencing and cross-agency coordination.
- Emphasis on problem-solving approaches.
- High levels of client awareness and accessibility.

Recommendations (1)

Strengthen policy framework and consistency

- Update and consolidate CAN policies and procedures to reflect current practice and statewide standards.
- Clarify definitions and expectations for key roles across regions.

Embed diversion and rapid-resolution practices

- Implement a consistent diversion and problem-solving screen at first contact (2-1-1, outreach, or HUB).
- Expand Flex Fund resources and provide ongoing diversion training.

Streamline intake and assessment

- Simplify tools and eliminate duplicative questions.
- Establish a uniform assessment form and standardized timelines.
- Standardize HUB hours and core services statewide.

Recommendations (2)

Refine prioritization and matching processes

- Develop a statewide prioritization tool to replace locally varied approaches.
- Improve tracking and analysis of referral outcomes.

Reorganize Housing Solutions Meetings

- Separate administrative updates from case conferencing.
- Automate routine matching decisions and focus meetings on complex cases.

Strengthen navigation, housing supply, and post-placement supports

- Establish housing navigator and landlord engagement roles.
- Enhance employment services, SSI/SSDI assistance, and CTI-based case management.

Improve governance and data transparency

- Clarify oversight roles among DOH, CCEH, CoCs, and backbone organizations.
- Standardize metrics and launch a statewide CAN performance dashboard.
