- Katie Durand, DOH provided the following information on Runaway & Homeless Youth (RHY):
 - For crisis intervention for unaccompanied minors who have nowhere to stay, contact the nearest RHY provider 24/7. RHY providers are trained to provide crucial support and services to minors without judgment. There are currently two federally funded RHY Basic Center Programs in CT that provide services and crisis beds for unaccompanied homeless minors: [Kids in Crisis](#) & [Greater Bridgeport Area Prevention Program](#)

6. Break-Out Groups

Groups met in break-out rooms and provided feedback on the following questions:

- What is your experience working with McKinney Vento homeless liaisons to help homeless children and youth access school and services?
 - MMW has been working closely with Meriden school district.
 - Hartford has good relationships with the liaisons and works closely with them.
 - New Haven in the past had strong relationships but recently it has been more difficult to find the liaisons and collaborate with them. It was noted that the contact information often is outdated and there is a lot of staff turnover.

- There is sometimes a misunderstanding by liaisons of who qualifies for services and students may be missing out on needed assistance.
- Do you have any tips to share?
 - Make sure that providers know who they need to contact and that staff knows about available services and rights of students and their families.
 - Successfully getting the services is contingent on the relationship providers have with the liaisons.
- Is there anything BOS can do to support this work?
 - New state law that codifies McKinney-Vento into state law is a huge first step but there is a need for dedicated funding to support there being dedicated staff within each school district.
 - There is a need to add a law about Head Start eligibility for children experiencing homelessness.
 - Continue to bring Michele in for trainings and share any other trainings that she offers. **f/u: HI to share EdAdvance trainings.**
 - **BOS could** get a list of all liaisons and can get it and send out to providers and update the list annually. **f/u: HI to provide list annually to providers**

7. HUD Updates & CoC Competition Discussion (see slides below for details)

- CoC 2025 & 2026 NOFO Lawsuits
- Adding Steering Committee seats
 - There are two points in the HUD NOFO for having a representative from a court managing Assisted Outpatient Treatment (AOT) and/or other civil commitment processes or from specialty courts (e.g., Mental Health Court, Drug Court, Care Court.)
 - The group discussed adding such a Steering Committee member. It was noted that currently there is a task force to set up a Mental Health Court. It was also noted that Community Partners in Action has staff that works out of the court system.
 - A motion was put forth to add a Steering Committee Rep from the Probate, Mental Health or Drug Court Systems. Motion passed by consensus.
 - **F/U HI to issue a call for nominations to fill this seat.**

 - There are 10 points in the CoC application for having a policy that aligns with HUD principles around substance use. BOS has already passed a policy. The proposal is to add new elements.
 - **F/U HI will be send out for vote via e-mail.**
 - A provider asked if distribution of fentanyl test strips was permitted. It was noted that HUD does not provide specific guidance regarding this activity for

CoC recipients/subrecipients but that SAMHSA notes that says this activity is not supported by SAMHSA. Distribution of fentanyl test strips is likely a high risk activity for CoC recipients/subrecipients.

- Selection of New HMIS Vendor is currently being reviewed by DOH and DMHAS as additional funding will be required. There were five vendors who responded to the RFP.
- Use of AI for Case Notes
 - The Data Strategy Board is currently reviewing acceptable use of Artificial Intelligence (AI) products as it relates to HMIS. Until that policy is adopted, users may not enter, upload, or otherwise disclose HMIS client information, personally identifiable information (PII), or protected data into any Public Generative AI (GenAI) Service.

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Basic Requirements of the McKinney-Vento Act



1

Federal McKinney-Vento Act

Subtitle VII-B of *McKinney-Vento Homeless Assistance Act*,
 reauthorized in 2015 by Title IX, Part A of the Every
 Student Succeeds Act

42 U.S.C. § 11431 et seq.

Guarantees educational rights and supports for students
 experiencing homelessness, and seeks to remove any
 barriers these students may face in succeeding in school.


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McKinney-Vento Definition of Homeless

Those who lack a fixed, regular and adequate nighttime residence, including students:

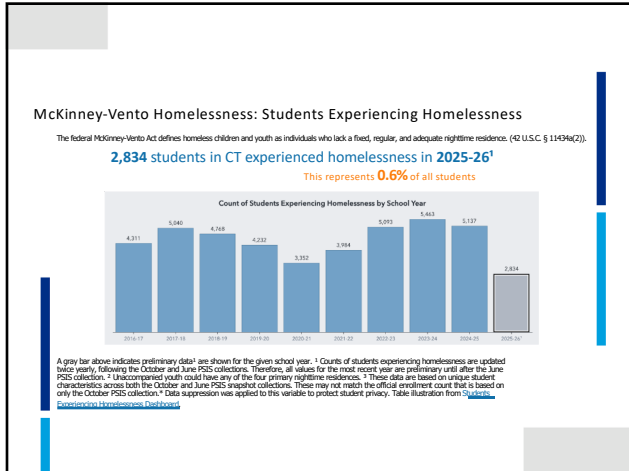
- Sharing housing due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason
- Living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, camping grounds due to a lack of alternative, adequate accommodation
- Living in emergency & transitional shelters
- Abandoned in hospitals
- Living in public or private places not designed for or ordinarily used as regular sleeping accommodations for human beings
- Living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, bus or train stations or similar situations
- Migratory children living in the above situations


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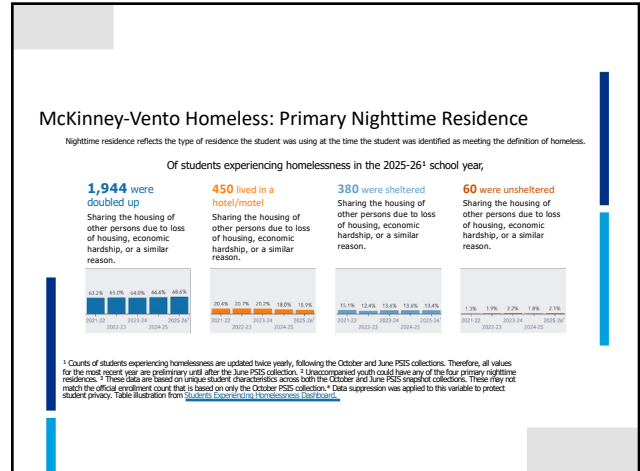
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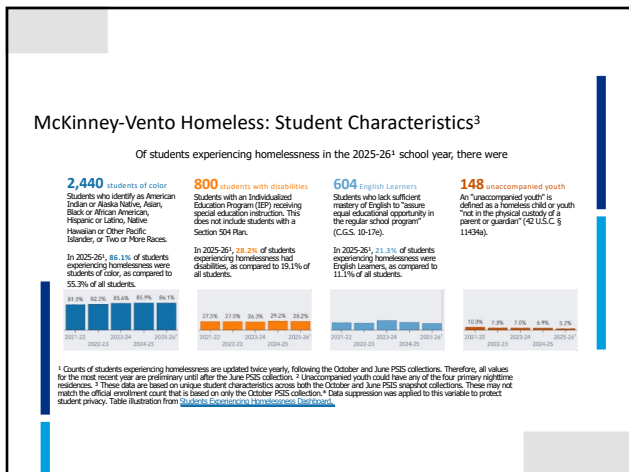
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Unaccompanied Homeless Youth (UHY)

- The term *unaccompanied youth* includes a homeless child or youth not in the physical custody of a parent or guardian. [42 U.S.C. § 11434a\(6\)](#)
 - Liaisons must assist UHY with enrollment, school selection, & dispute resolution
 - Have the same right to immediate enrollment & educational services as other students

Unaccompanied Homeless Youth

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Unaccompanied Homeless Youth (UHY)

- There are no age limits in the McKinney-Vento Act
- Eligibility is based on the student's housing
- Pathways to homelessness for unaccompanied youth:
 - 35% of youth experienced the death of at least one parent or caregiver
 - 44% of youth had been in foster care
 - 24% were homeless with their families before becoming unaccompanied



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Local Education Agency Liaison

McKinney-Vento Act requires every local educational agency (LEA or school district) to designate a local homeless education liaison

42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(1)(j)(ii)

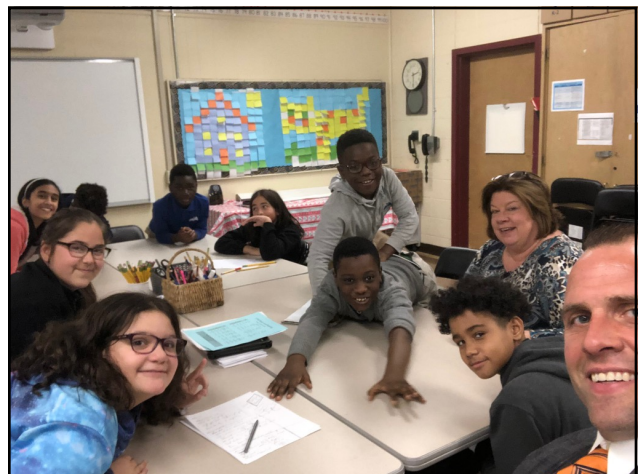
Local liaison serves as the district's lead homeless education contact, and is required to fulfill the duties established in the Act

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Local Liaison Duties

- Ensure HCY are identified in coordination with others
- Ensure immediate enrollment & access to services
- Provide information about rights & opportunities
 - Includes meaningful opportunities for parents to participate in their children's education
 - Includes transportation, school meals, & other programs
- Ensure disputes are mediated
- May affirm for Housing and Urban Development programs that HCY meet MV eligibility criteria



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Local Liaison Duties

- Support UHY in school selection & dispute resolution
- Ensure UHY are provided verification of their status for FAFSA purposes
- Provide training & other support for school personnel
- Provide referrals to services in the community
- Collaborate & coordinate services with State Coordinators, community and school personnel
 - Includes collecting & reporting data



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Requirement to Remove Barriers

States and school districts must **develop, review, and revise policies**

- To remove barriers to the school identification, enrollment and retention of McKinney-Vento students
- Includes barriers due to outstanding fees or fines, or absences

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(1)(I)



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Immediate Enrollment

Enroll and *enrollment* includes “attending classes & participating fully in all school activities”

42 U.S.C. § 11434a(1)

Enrollment must be immediate

- Even if students lack school, medical, or other records normally required
- Even if enrollment or application deadlines were missed while homeless
- Even if the student has history of absences or outstanding fines/fees

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(C)(i)



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School Selection

Option 1: School of origin: the school the student attended when permanently housed or the school the student last attended

- Includes public preschools
- Includes receiving schools

Option 2: Local attendance area school: any public school that nonhomeless students living in the same location have the right to attend



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School Selection

Can remain in the school of origin

- For the duration of the homelessness
- Until the end of the school year in which the student obtains housing
- If the student becomes homeless over the summer & is still homeless at start of school year

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(A)(i)(II)

Decisions are based on the individual student's best interest

42 U.S.C. § 11432(g)(3)(B)



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Best Interest

- School of origin is presumed to be in student's best interest
 - Unless this is contrary to parent or UHY's wishes
- Consider student-centered factors
 - Impact of mobility on achievement, education, health, & safety

42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(B)



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Transportation

HCY eligible for transportation to/from school of origin

42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(1)(f)(iii)

- Right to transportation extends
 - For the duration of the homelessness **and**
 - Until the end of the school year in which they obtain housing
- Transportation comparable to what others receive

42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(3)(A)(2)

42 U.S.C. §11432(g)(4)(A)



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Dispute Resolution

- Disputes may be over: eligibility, school selection, or enrollment
- If enrollment is denied, a written statement must be given explaining the reason and appeal process
 - Provided in a format and language the parent, guardian, or unaccompanied homeless youth can understand
- The parent/youth must be immediately referred to the liaison
- Students must be enrolled and receive services while a dispute is mediated



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Categorical Eligibility

- Free school meals [42 U.S.C. § 1758(b)(5)(A)(b)]
- Services under Title I, Part A [20 U.S.C. § 6315(c)(2)(E)]
- All educational and support services comparable to what other students receive, including extra-curricular activities



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Coordinated Entry Partnership 5 Strategies for Schools and COCs

1. Get to know each other

- Establishing contact to familiarize partners and programs.
- Conduct shared needs assessments.
- Produce & distribute information, EX: education issues along with available housing options.

2. Connect early and regularly.

- Recruit and involve schools in program planning/implementation process.
- Include each other in professional development and staff training.
- Host shared events, EX: parent workshops at shelter or library.



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Coordinated Entry Partnership 5 Strategies for Schools and COCs

3. Develop protocols to guide ongoing engagement.

- Making referrals.
- Sharing information and data.
- Maintaining confidentiality.

4. Reassess engagement periodically.

- Communicate with each other on what's working and what needs improvement.
- Ensure awareness and students' needs are being met.

5. Explore shared funding opportunities

- Consider working together on grants, contracts, donations, sponsorships, memberships and event fees that build/support partner relationship.



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Mc Kinney Vento: Provisions for Very Young Children

- McV Liaisons (state & local) must have plans defined that ensure family/child access to Early Head Start & Head Start, Even Start and other public preschool programs *that are administered by the LEA (local education agency/district)*
- Homeless children are categorically eligible for Early Head Start & Head Start programs
- Early care programs *funded by a local education agency* are required to identify and prioritize homeless children for enrollment; allow homeless to enroll while required paperwork is obtained; and coordinate with local McV liaisons

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The Face of Family Homelessness

- Over 42% of homeless young women between the ages of 18-25 are pregnant or parenting
- Over 27% of families in HUD shelters are headed by someone under the age of 25
- Homeless teens are at particularly high risk for pregnancy, with as many as 20 % becoming pregnant

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National Child Data- 2022-2023

(SchoolHouse Connection)



- Nearly 700,000 children under the age of six
- Including 450,000 infants & toddlers



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- Infancy is the age at which a person is most likely to become homeless
- Approximately half of the children staying in HUD shelters are under the age of six
- According to the US Department of Education, in 2023-24 there were 1,5 million children who experienced homelessness
- 70,000 babies were born to mothers who experienced homelessness during their pregnancy

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Head Start on Housing

Our Beginning

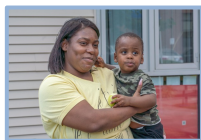
Since January 2022, the Connecticut Department of Housing (DOH) has allocated housing vouchers for families whose children are participating in CT's Head Start (HS) and Early Head Start (EHS) programs.

- In January 2022, the Connecticut Office of Early Childhood (OEC) received **25** housing vouchers from DOH for EHS/HS families.
- In June 2022, Governor Lamont, DOH and OEC announced an additional **35** Housing Choice vouchers for the program.
- In September 2022, CT DOH changed its administrative plan to allocate approximately fifty (50) Housing Choice vouchers **annually** for Head Start and Early Head Start families.

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Head Start on Housing Where We Stand

- HSOH has housed **150** families with **329** children
 - Specifically, **92** school-aged children and **237** Head Start/Early Head Start aged children

The Next Chapter

State Investment in Head Start on Housing

- **State Support Expanding:** Governor Lamont's FY2026–FY2027 biennium budget includes funding for approximately **200 State Rental Assistance Program (RAP) vouchers** dedicated to HSOH
- **Implementation Timeline:** These vouchers are slated to begin in **FY2027**, starting **July 1, 2026**.
- **Impact:** This investment will help more families secure stable, affordable housing, reinforcing the program's focus on long-term family stability and child development.
- **Momentum:** The inclusion of RAP vouchers in the biennium budget underscores state recognition that housing stability is a critical part of early childhood success.

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Thrive From the Start Grant

- CT received a \$100,000 Thrive from the Start State Capacity Building Grant to address homelessness and housing instability for pregnant people and children prenatal to 3 in Connecticut.
- The initiative aligns early childhood, housing, health, and homeless response systems to improve service coordination and outcomes for young families.
- EdAdvance serves as the lead agency and was selected through a competitive national process, recognizing its leadership and partnerships in supporting families experiencing homelessness.

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HUD Updates & CoC Competition Discussion



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Lawsuits - CoC NOFO



- Court found FY25 NOFO violated the law
- **2 new lawsuits Challenge FY26 CoC NOFO provisions, including:**
 - Set-aside for new Transitional Housing and Supportive Services Only projects (limits funding for permanent housing)
 - New scoring criteria on required participation in services and SUD treatment
 - Policy changes through the NOFO not required federal rulemaking process
 - Self-sufficiency criteria
 - Expanded risk review authority
 - Drug-related scoring and certification provisions

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Lawsuit Challenging FY2026 CoC NOFO (2)



- **Challenged provisions (continued):**
 - Law enforcement and encampment related criteria
 - Prioritization of older adults and people with physical/developmental disabilities over people with behavioral health disability
 - Compliance with Executive Orders unrelated to CoC purpose and requirements (e.g., Diversity, Equity and Inclusion; gender identity; immigration enforcement)
- Lawsuits seek to invalidate challenged provisions
- FY26 NOFO remains in effect - competition deadline remains 8/26/26
- Continue preparing applications unless court intervenes or HUD pulls NOFO

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CT BOS Substance Use Policies Discussion, Vote by e-mail

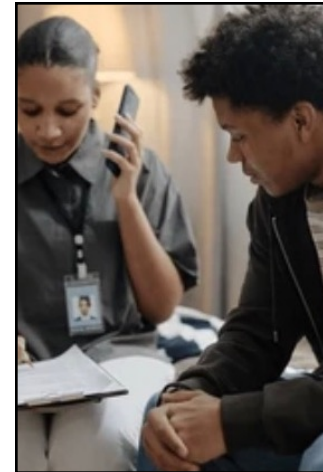
Substance Use Policy:
Up to 10 points on CoC Application:

Policy already adopted: Ensures that housing projects will not operate safe consumption sites, distribute drug paraphernalia, permit the use of illegal drugs on property under their control, or permit or encourage these activities.

Policy must (NEW):

- Describe remedies to be taken for violations, Encourage SUD treatment and recovery housing,
- Not restrict/prohibit CoC funded housing projects from requiring sobriety or participation in treatment.

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Guidance on HUD CoC Service Participation Requirements

Guidance on Service Participation Requirements:

HUD introduced strong incentives for service participation requirements

This guidance for implementing service participation requirements promotes:

- accountability
- participant choice
- housing stability
- recovery-oriented practice

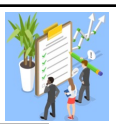
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Street Outreach 2027 Renewal Evaluation Criteria Benchmarks - Discuss today, vote by e-mail

- Outreach Criteria were previously adopted
- Some benchmarks not set pending performance data

Criteria	2026 Average Performance	Proposed 2027 Benchmark
Adult participants who increase any cash income from entry to exit/follow-up	16%	20%
Participants who exited to Permanent Housing	38%	40%
Participants who exited to Shelter or other positive destination	70%	70%

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2027 Renewal Evaluation Criteria

CT BOS 2027 Renewal Evaluation Criteria

- No changes to criteria adopted by Steering Committee in 2026
- Lowered points for earned income and returns
 - No longer required by HUD @25%
- Youth Navigators scored in 2027
- Lower benchmarks previously recommended by Work Group and adopted by Steering Committee being implemented
